We have navigated snow, frost and winds during January and early February but the snowdrops are displaying their grandeur and the days are getting brighter. January is often seen as a very long month, a difficult month but yet I have witnessed amazing beauty in creation, the resilience of people amidst adversity, the servant attitude of parishioners, the willingness to demonstrate hope and the church family gathering for worship and fellowship on many different occasions.

Sunday the 4th February was very special in so many ways as we launched the Lent Appeal to support the mission and ministry of the Leprosy Mission as they reflect on 150 years. It's amazing to think it all started in Leixlip, County Kildare with Wellesley and Alice Bailey after visiting India and setting up the 'Mission to Lepers' in 1974. We welcomed Stephen McCartney who spoke at the 8.30 am and 11.30 am services and shared the scriptures and stories such as Sunil [you can see it on the livestream]. We shared in a breakfast provided by the Confirmation Group and their parents with the coffee bar full over those two hours. We gave out 50 smartie tubes to the children to fill with coins and return them at Easter. We will explore another fundraiser for after Easter in this milestone in the ministry of the Leprosy Mission. All ideas are welcome!

'Messy Love' was the theme at 4.00 pm in the hall as we gathered for Messy Church and 60 adults and children enjoyed some crafts based on this theme of 'love' and then Gareth led us in some songs and shared the story of the lost sheep, coin and son using a visual presentation reflecting God's love for us. We then enjoyed pancakes, chocolate spread and strawberries. Christ Church Youth then met at 7.30 pm as the group prepare for confirmation and they explore the theme of the 'bible' that evening. A very full day. A day of engagement with a wider group of people of all ages. A day with greater capacity as a church that we have longed for in terms of our mission in this city. Do spread the word about the next Messy Church which is on Sunday 3rd March at 4.00 pm at Lisburn High Rise. Booking is essential. See the link in the magazine or on What's App.

Another significant aspect of church life is the number of parishioners who are speaking at the Prayer Fellowship on a Wednesday night. This has been such a blessing and a sense of building one another up in following Jesus as we have looked at the 12 disciples before Christmas and now the miracles of Jesus. The group size has grown and a warm welcome awaits in meeting with the Lord and in prayer.

Sanctuary Mental Health Course

28 people have journeyed on this course for 8 sessions as we finish on Tuesday 19th March. We have been challenged by the stories of people in each session as they share about their mental illness. We have reflected on their stories, the story of scripture and the significance of our worth, how we cope with mental illness and build community. It has certainly raised awareness of mental illness in each of us and how we as a church love, care, listen and signpost.

I pray for wisdom on how we build on this course in the life of our parish and for each person. A resource was prepared for each session which included a prayer as well as reflecting on Psalm 42 each week.

Confirmation – Sunday 10th March

We gather on Mothering Sunday at 10.30 am for this special service for our 8 young people: Zara, Harry, April, Matilda, Scarlett, Aimee-Rose, Ellie and Holly. I think of all who have shaped their lives and faith in their families, school life and in our church family. On Mothering Sunday, I am conscious of all who have shaped the lives of faith in the bible especially mothers such as Mary, Sarah, Elizabeth, Ruth and Eunice. We look forward to having Bishop George with us on Mothering Sunday. We do hope to have KLIC & Creche with them being in the hall from 10.30 am and join the service partly way through it.

We look forward to seeing how God shapes the lives of our young people in the coming months and years. Please do pray for each of our young people and all our leaders in JAM & CCY. Pray for Bishop George as he leads this service and speaks and as we join in fellowship in the hall after the service.

St Patrick's Day – Sunday 17th March

This special day falls on a Sunday this year and we have two services, our All Age at 11.30 am and Evening Worship at 6.30 pm.

Many myths surround Patrick and many will celebrate him without once thinking of his Christian faith and missionary zeal. He returned to this land where he had been a slave because God had called him to bring the good news of Jesus Christ to this nation. As I reflect on the state of our land and church, I wonder what Patrick would think of it? What would he say to us? Would it be the transforming power of Jesus Christ to set people on a new pathway and direction in life?

Holy Week - "Who is Jesus? Journey to the Cross"

Palm Sunday is the week after St Patrick's Day and it allows us to again focus on Jesus and his journey to a Cross through our worship services, fellowship, BBQ at the gate on Maundy Thursday and joining with other Christians on Good Friday before we journey from the crucifixion to the empty tomb. This week does take us through all that Jesus experienced in showing the Father's love for us and what he experienced by dying to save us. Have a look at the variety of services and take time to journey to the Cross with the Easter hope with the focus on Wednesday, Maundy Thursday and Good Friday evenings.

Remember the clocks go forward on Easter Sunday this year.

Easter - Alive Series

So often after a 'festival' we move on to the next thing. With the 'Easter season' we have 40 days to ponder the wonder and hope of the resurrection of Jesus Christ. This Easter we will use the 'Alive' Series on a Sunday and then on a Tuesday night at 7.30 pm in the coffee bar. We start the series on Sunday 14th April and on Tuesday 23rd April. The series allows us to look deeper in to some of the Easter stories and will include some videos and a book:

Mary Magdalene – Transformed by Love Cleopas and his wife on the Road to Emmaus – Surprised by Hope Thomas and the Disciples – Filled with Peace Peter – Living in Freedom Paul – Fulfilling our Purpose

Local Primary Schools

The financial summary of the parish finances for 2023 will also be presented.

This year Ash Wednesday is the 14th of February, which is St Valentine's Day. I wonder which day did you place a focus on or maybe you didn't acknowledge either? Did you 'deny' yourself some luxury or did you demonstrate extravagant love to someone? Denial and love are part of taking up that cross to follow Jesus.

There are rhythms in life that allow us as followers of Jesus to draw us closer to him through a period such as Lent. We recommended the book 'Our Radiant Redeemer' by Tim Chester for Lent. I marvel at the opportunity as we have looked at 'spiritual disciplines' such as service, simplicity, fasting, solitude and meditation to bring us closer to Jesus in order to share his good news. May we use Holy Week and Easter to ponder God's love for us and what the hope of the resurrection brings to us in our daily lives, community and in our nation as we now have a government at Stormont?

Android


A little more complicated. You might need to download an app on your app store/google play store called "QR code scanner". There are lots to choose from and most will work fine.

The past 6 months have disappeared in the blink of an eye for the Campbell family as we have settled into new rhythms and routines here in Christ Church.

Once again thank you all for the kind and patient welcome that we have enjoyed, and as I'm sure you can tell from the noise of my children, we feel quite at home now.

On Sunday 11th February I was reflecting on the importance of simplicity in our relationship with Christ, and often as Christians we can tend over complicate things, focus too much on who believes what, and in that moment forget to focus on Christ.

The great Swiss theologian Karl Barth, who has written many books that have inspired me and that have helped shape my ministry was once asked "Please can you summarise your life's work?" He responded -

"In the words of a song I learned at my mother's knee: 'Jesus loves me, this I know, for the Bible tells me so.'"

Our ministry to our children and young people must continue to be a priority for us here in Christ Church for two very important reasons.

Firstly, to ensure that our future generations continue to have an understanding of Christ similar to Barth's and secondly so that we may learn from them in the simplicity how to better love Jesus ourselves.

For me, there is no greater joy on a Sunday than seeing our children and young people worship, sing and pray in a way which doesn't matter who is watching. We asked the children about Jesus at the front of church and they told us "he can make us better," "he loves us" and "he can do absolutely anything." What a wonderful testimony to Jesus that is!

We have a number of very important dates coming up in the ministry that we would love you to support and invite people to in making sure our young people continue to trust in Him that can do anything.

March 10th is our Confirmation Service when a number of young people will stand up and make promises and commitments about their faith. This service is at 10.30 am and will be led by Bishop George followed by tea

and coffee in the hall. We would love the church to be as full as possible for this event as we support and encourage these young people in their walk with Jesus.

March 3rd is our next Messy Church event and supported by the Education Authority we are funding a trip to Lisburn High Rise for lots of activity and worship. This is open to all our children and young people with lots to keep all ages entertained.

March 27th, during Holy Week we are having a special evening we're calling Messy Easter. This Messy Church will be a bit bigger and a bit more extravagant as we take our children through the journey of the Easter story with some special guests joining us to help us out. This event will run for one night with limited spaces, however if there is extreme demand we may consider a second performance.

Finally, a big thank you to all the volunteers and leaders across all our groups who make our ministry work so well. They meet week in, week out, giving their time, energy and resources for the benefit of others. We are blessed with many volunteers who go above and beyond, and we will never truly see all the work that goes on behind closed doors. We give thanks for you!

We especially give thanks for those who are learning how to work with me and my chaotic, loud and ever so slightly disorganised personality as we try and push boundaries and stretch ourselves to reach others. Thank you for your patience, and thank you again for all your work and commitment.

Leprosy (Hansen's Disease)

On the 25th January, I had the pleasure to meet and hug two people with leprosy, Dan Izzett and his lovely wife Babs here in Lisburn at LMNI office. Leprosy is one of the oldest diseases known to man, and one that's predominantly linked with poverty but when Dan Izzett contracted leprosy, he was living a comfortable life in the suburbs of Harare in Zimbabwe.

Dan, a retired pastor has battled constant pain since his original diagnosis all those years ago. His right leg has been amputated from below the knee. He has fingers missing and his hands don't function as they should. He did, however, made a conscious decision to use his experience for good, and he and his wife Babs now travel the world with the message that there is life after leprosy.

Dan believes he received a 'God-given passport' to reach out with hope to people affected by the disease. He even chose not to have corrective surgery on his 'clawed' leprosy-affected hands so he could connect with as many fellow sufferers as possible.

'Leprosy is not hugely prevalent in Zimbabwe where he grew up,' he says. 'But now that he knows something about the disease, he realised that he began to have symptoms at the age of 12 or 13.'

Dan told us how he and Babs met and they had only been married for three months when he was first diagnosed in 1972. He was working as a civil engineering technician at the time and could afford to pay to be treated with a forerunner to multi-drug therapy, 'his was after a wrong initial diagnosis' the effective treatment for leprosy patients today. The pain caused by the disease was far from over though, and Dan was admitted to hospital with what is known as 'Type 2 leprosy reaction' with joint pain and lesions on the face and legs as the body fought to rid itself of the dead bacteria during treatment.

He clearly remembers feeling terrible in his hospital bed, when suddenly his room lit up with an awesome light,' says Dan. 'He felt extremely peaceful and really relaxed, and a little while later his minister and Babs visited him and asked him what was different. He told them what had happened and his minister said, "I guess Jesus still visits those with leprosy." He was happy to accept that something had happened. He talked about still having pain today, but from that point in time there was a very good response to whatever drugs he took.'

In 1977 Dan and Babs were dealt a further blow when Babs was diagnosed with leprosy.

Dan, who became a Christian as a young boy, admitted his faith has been tested over the years. 'It would be unnatural not to ask, "Why me?",' he said. 'But you just have to reflect for a moment, look at life and realise that at the end of the day our Father knows what's happening to us. He has leprosy and his body has taken a lot of flack over it but he never wanted to become a victim of the disease.'

In 1999, while working as a pastor at a Vineyard church, he and Babs had planted in Zimbabwe, Dan felt prompted to do some advocacy work on behalf of The Leprosy Mission. He also felt it was right to tell his church congregation about his and his wife's leprosy.

'The church was full,' he recalls. 'They had told people they were going to give their testimony. They stood at the door of the church afterwards and every single person shook their hands and asked them over and over again, "Why did you not tell us before?"

Dan described how emotional it was.

Dan has since travelled to India during his time as a board member for The Leprosy Mission International, and it was there that he saw what a blessing his clawed hands were.

'Because he is a Caucasian visitor, he said there was no way people living in Indian leprosy colonies would think he was affected by the disease. But when doing the traditional Namaste greeting in India, where you put your hands together and bow your head, they were astonished to see that he had leprosy-affected hands. Suddenly no words were needed. They knew he understood and that they were all the same. Dan said this was my passport for connecting with them, human to human. It transcends language and race.

'It was a deeply humbling experience, particularly when he was sat next to a man with the same amputation as him. But whereas Dan had a £4,000 state-of-the art prosthetic limb, he was using part of a plastic pipe to hobble around on.'

Dan's experience has spurred him on to battle prejudice. He and Babs have since spent many years travelling large parts of the world talking about their leprosy.

Dan and Babs have seen a lot and learnt a lot. Leprosy is easily treated; all leprosy drugs are now free. But the problem is locating the patients and getting the drugs to them and that costs money. Many are in a bad condition when they come so they need lots of medical care. It's key to have early diagnosis and to have people on the ground. The fight against this disease is far from over,' he says. 'Dan has admitted encountering stigma on the odd occasion and he had to deal with that, but he wants to eliminate that stigma and educate people.

'For example, leprosy does not eat your flesh. What happens is that it numbs your sensation, you have no feeling, you have anaesthetic feet, and it's quite easy to burn yourself and to bump yourself and that's where the problems are.

Dan and Babs said 'It's been extraordinary and so positive to be able to have God use us. We want to break open people's hearts and minds to the message that leprosy is not what it is made out to be; that you can make a go of life.

'Leprosy is not the end.'

Some facts about Leprosy

Leprosy is a mildly infectious disease caused by a bacterium called Mycobacterium leprae (a relative of the tuberculosis bacterium or 'TB' germ). It can stay in the body for up to 20 years without showing symptoms.

Leprosy causes nerve damage which can lead to disability and the amputation of limbs. Leprosy also damages nerves in the face, causing problems with blinking, eventually leading to blindness. It is not hereditary and it cannot be caught by touch.

It is most common in places of poverty where overcrowding and poor nutrition and housing allow people to become more susceptible to infection.

Leprosy is curable with multi-drug therapy (MDT), which was developed in the 1980s. Within one day of starting MDT, there is no risk of the disease spreading to anyone else. Lack of education, however, means that many people affected by leprosy are still stigmatised, even after they have been cured, especially if the disease has caused disability.

Jesus still visits those with leprosy.




